Some time ago we embarked on a programme to develop an Appleby Parish Neighbourhood Plan (APNP) which is a community-led whole parish process of how residents want to see the area in which you live evolve over the coming years.

This important project is being taken care of by Joy Powell along with a small team. Joy has put together the following article so as to explain the process of drawing up the Appleby Parish Neighbourhood Plan. It also gives you an update of its current status as well as explain the steps to be taken to realise the goal.

We are also asking for anyone 16 or under who lives in or has a close connection to the parish to participate in the work. More on that at the end of Joy's feature.

What is a Neighbourhood Plan?

A Neighbourhood Plan is a community-led framework for guiding the future development, regeneration and conservation of an area. It is about the use and development of land and may contain a vision, aims, planning policies, proposals for improving the area or providing new facilities, or allocation of key sites for specific kinds of development. It may deal with a wide range of social, economic and environmental issues (such as housing, employment, heritage and transport) or it may focus on one or two issues only. These may be issues that are relevant to the whole neighbourhood or just to part of the neighbourhood. This is for those producing the plan to decide.

How are we doing?

We have established a small team working on the plan but this is not exclusive and anybody who wants to get more involved is very welcome.

The Neighbourhood Area for Appleby Parish has been designated as the parish boundary including the historical border to the East which follows the line of the old River Ancholme.

Develop a vision and objectives

Firstly the requirement to identify the strengths, weaknesses, issues and views of the parish residents. The initial involvement of seeking residents (and visitors) views took place at a APNP stand during the Summer Fayre where attendees were invited to write down their views of the parish. This was followed by a community wide in depth survey which carried out in August. The results were published in a summary form in the autumn edition of this newsletter as well as a full twenty page report being available to view or download from the Appleby website. Parish Council Vacancy



The next key steps are as follows:

Draft a Vision and Objectives



are effective community involvement / engagement from the beginning to end of the

process as well as showing robust evidence base of involvement.

Our vision must be realistic and achievable. For example, a vision could include reference to what the area will look like, what facilities there will be, what quality of facility will be and what the social and economic outlook for the area will be.

Objectives are more detailed. They set out how the vision will be achieved and may include details of specific projects or actions to be implemented as part of delivering the vision. There is no limit on the number of objectives and in some cases it may be appropriate for each element of the vision to have one or more objectives linked to it.

As well as making sure our vision and objectives are in line with existing local planning policy, it is important to make sure that our community supports them as well. The more community support we have the better the plan will be especially when it comes to the referendum stage.

Following public participation, any necessary amendments can be made before we move on to develop the detailed content of the Neighbourhood Plan including policies that will be used by North Lincolnshire Council when they determine planning applications.

Develop the Plan:

Develop the policies and an implementation plan as well as finalise a draft of the Neighbourhood Plan. Community engagement and involvement should continue throughout the plan making process and should be flexible to address emerging issues and concerns.

Independent Examination:

Submit to North Lincolnshire Council, Neighbourhood Plan considered by an impartial Examiner.

Referendum:

Open to anyone who is registered to vote in the Neighbourhood Plan area, requires a majority in favour of the plan.

If the referendum indicates community support the plan is adopted by North Lincolnshire Council and it will be used by them when determining planning applications in our area.

It is the natural cycle of rural communities that sees an ebbing and flowing of its

population and with this corresponding highs and lows of involvement and interest in the activities associated with organisations like the village hall.

Our parish has been fortunate to have people who have ability or interest which they use to generate events and create a momentum which draws the community together in social activity and thereby fund raising. Without such people and the support they give the village hall could not continue.





The past year has, however, seen a reduction in the variety of events on offer from the committee as our number has been depleted and with it some of the talent we had come to rely upon. Whilst those of us who remain are happy to offer a calendar of quiz, pub nights and Fayre day, which continue to be successful, I am hopeful the future will see a resurgent interest in the committee and with it new ideas and areas of activity.

The long awaited Hall refurbishment has now begun and the parish and hall users will be kept informed of all schedules and changes as they occur via the internal notice board and the Appleby Facebook page.

Exciting New Facility: The Community Cafe - The committee will establish via consultation how we may best meet the needs of our community and with the help of volunteers provide a service tailored to the times and dates which encourage its greatest use. It is the committee's intention to provide the community café free of charge for entry. However community groups wishing to use the room outside of its timetabled openings will be able to do so on an hourly hire basis.

Once complete it is our intention to hold an event to which all members of the parish will be invited along with representatives of the funders and other interested parties.

This celebration of our achievement will also signal the committee's continuing in its work to secure the hall for future use by investigating the possibility of further grant assistance towards the replacement of our ageing boilers, further restoration of the brickwork and installation of replacement doors and windows to the extension building.

I would like to conclude by making public my gratitude to the committee for their continued work in the organisation of events and support of other functions within the hall, to Cliff Chase for always putting in far more than is asked and to the residents of Appleby without whose attendance and enthusiasm we would have small purpose.

I would also like to thank the trustees for their continued oversight and sponsorship of the halls future.

And finally, a plea, that anyone with an interest in joining the work of the committee can be sure they will be made most welcome.

Parking and Verges

This year Appleby village was not placed in the Best Kept Village award.

Two reasons among others was the inconsiderate parking of vehicles in some parts of the village as well as vehicle damage to verges. The damage to verges is caused in part because of the obstruction resulting from thoughtless parking as well as by the large agricultural and other large vehicles using the village roads.

To help reduce the risk of damage to the verges please park off the roads. Visitors should be asked to park on drives or in areas where there is sufficient room for two-way traffic including large agricultural vehicles to pass without having to resort to drive over verges.

- In the Middle Ages Appleby's weekly market was thought to be held on a Thursday and the market cross still remains. Or does it? Some believe that the base of the "market cross" at the crossroads in the village and another stone in the Hall grounds both came from Thorneholme Priory.
