Parish Council Keeping You Informed

Chairman Appleby Parish Council

Thank goodness the winter is now behind us and we are looking forward to spring sunshine and warmer days. The gardeners amongst us will be welcoming this time of year and also looking forward to planting the new crops for summer harvest. Which brings me quite nicely onto the old subject of allotments. You may recall that the Parish Council have been attempting (unfortunately not very successfully) to find a piece of land which can be used for villagers to have allotment plots within the village. Sadly our efforts came to nought so we had to broaden our horizons and look elsewhere.

Winterton seemed to be the obvious choice, should the Town Council have spare plots available for us to take over. I approached Council members at Winterton to enquire if plots were available at their Holmes Lane site, which is a few miles to the north of Appleby. I attended one of their Council meetings and put Appleby's case forward for our villagers to have the opportunity to 'hire' either full or part plots on their site. Thwarted once again following this, as Winterton residents have 'first dibs' on vacant plots and as there were only 6 available at the time I requested, all these were taken up (bar one) at the start of their allotment year, which commences in March. So we are back where we started. I apologise for the length of time it's taken even to get to this stage, but the Parish Council will keep on trying.

As mentioned in previous Newsletters Appleby Parish Neighbourhood Plan is being developed and is now well on its' way to being completed. Many thanks to all the residents who have given their ideas and views during the process of consultations and surveys. In this edition the Group developing the plans have now concluded the objectives, these can be found at page 3.

During the consultations for the Appleby Parish Neighbourhood Plan a number of residents touched upon air quality around the parish. North Lincolnshire Council's Environmental Health department actively monitor the air around the region and particularly around the steel works. The results for the parish are outlined on page 4 and 5.

You may have noticed that the meeting days for Parish Council has changed. After a period of considerable debating it was decided that the majority of Councillors were free from other tasks and meetings on Tuesdays rather than Mondays, so we start regular Parish Council meetings at 7.00pm on Tuesday evenings in the village hall. Our next meeting, which is open to the general public, (as all our meetings are and we welcome your attendance), is on Tuesday 25th April, and the May meeting (which is also the Annual Parish Meeting) is on Tuesday 23rd. This one commences at 6.00pm so that matters can be discussed prior to the regular 7.00pm get-together. We look forward to seeing you there.

Village Hall News Clive Prior Appleby Fayre Committee


Appleby Country Fayre 18 June 2017

Appleby Parish Neighbourhood Plan

Appleby Parish Neighbourhood Plan Group

Work has progressed steadily since Christmas and the drafting of Your Parish, your future the final document has reached a critical stage with the

confirmation of the Vision, Objectives and the identification and wording of the Planning Policies. When / if the plan is adopted North Lincolnshire Council will by law have to take into account our Planning Policies when considering planning applications. This will include any new buildings or alterations to existing buildings in the parish.

The policies are being appraised by North Lincolnshire Council to ensure they do not conflict with their own policies.

The final wording for our Vision is:

Appleby a rural parish in the Ancholme Valley, whose natural environment and distinctive buildings should be preserved and enhanced.

Objectives

A number of key objectives have been identified setting out the principal priorities for future development to enable this vision to be delivered throughout the Parish.

- 1: seek to ensure that any development is acceptable in planning terms with reference to design, scale, access, residential amenity, impact on visual amenity, drainage, ecology and all policies contained within this Neighbourhood Plan;
- 2: promote a high standard of design and scale which reflects the local character of the Parish of Appleby and incorporates high standards of energy efficiency and flexibility to meet the changing needs of present and future generations;
- 3: support appropriate applications for infill development where it reflects the local character of the settlement in terms of scale and design and will contribute to enhancing the built environment of the Parish for instance to enable those wishing to 'downsize' but remain living within the Parish;
- 4: foster the rural community by supporting applications for affordable housing at appropriate sites intended to meet needs of affordable housing in the rural area as identified by North Lincolnshire Council's Strategic Housing Market Assessment;
- 5: support the local economy by encouraging the conversion of existing redundant and other buildings to provide suitable business and sustainable employment opportunities which respect the character of the local countryside, in particular, opportunities for a farm shop, the development of traditional/artisan craft enterprises and live-work units where appropriate;
- 6: promote social development by safeguarding and enhancing community facilities and open spaces to support health and wellbeing for everyone's benefit and to sustain communities including promoting the provision of children's play space at Santon;
- 7: support the relevant highway authority in securing highway improvements throughout the Parish;
- 8: support measures to improve public transport, highway safety and to improve accessibility for non-vehicular users to access the countryside;
- 9: protect, conserve and enhance the character of the local built environment and the area's heritage assets including the Conservation Area in Appleby village;
- 10: support measures to introduce a heritage trail throughout the Parish highlighting the wealth of historic cultural features;
- 11: safeguard and enhance the countryside within the Parish and its distinctive landscape character as part of the Ancholme Valley. In the open countryside, outside of settlements and green infrastructure corridors, development will only be supported where it is essential for the purposes of agriculture, agricultural diversification and forestry; and
- 12: protect and enhance the network of habitats, watercourses and wildlife corridors that are important for biodiversity and geology and any other areas suitable to create an integrated network of natural habitats throughout the Parish.

The wording of the draft plan has incorporated the your views as expressed so far during the consultations and will be available for your comments before being sent to North Lincolnshire Council and then for formal appraisal by an independent assessor.

Following this there will be a referendum for all residents on whether you want to adopt the plan

Appleby's Heritage The Iron Industry 1860 to 1867

This, the second article in a series on the Winn family of Appleby who, as landowners became the creators and main contributors to what was to become the substantive growth of Iron making in the district. This development took place during mid 19C to early 20C. We now move forward with a brief look at key events between 1860 to 1867

The rise of the Scunthorpe iron industry began with the discovery, or the rediscovery by Roland Winn in 1858 of the early Romano-British workings of the Appleby and Frodingham ore fields The ore bed is a lens shape seam running north-to south stretching from the Humber to what is today Ashby Ville. The ore's greatest thickness being near Santon at about thirty-two feet.

Key events 1860 to 1867

1860: South Yorkshire Railway and River Don Company (SYR) line completed from Doncaster to Keady where it terminated. To move goods easier from Scunthorpe, in November 1860 Parliament approved a bill for railway to be constructed by Charles Winn as sponsor from Keadby to Barnetby. The line was to be knows as the Trent, Ancholme Grimsby railway.

1864: The Dawes' Trent Iron Works furnaces came on line and started production. The site was about midway along what is Dawes Lane today.

1864: Rowland Winn agreed with a Leeds brick-maker, Joseph Cliff, to build furnaces



on leased land about a mile to the east of Scunthorpe station forming the Frodingham

1864: A group of Manchester businessmen led by Daniel Adamson built their first furnace during the summer of 1865, the largest in the area, standing seventy feet high and measuring twenty feet in the bosh, and close-topped. The new company was named the North Lincolnshire Iron Co.

1866: Trent, Ancholme Grimsby railway completed and opened

1867: Appleby Iron Company was formed. Work commenced constructing 3 blast furnaces and all ancillary works on Appleby Estate just west of the boundary for Santon / Santon Beck on what was Santon Lane and being connected by a branch railway to the Trent Ancholme and Grimsby line. Due to a number of technicals issues production did not commence until 1876

In future issues we will look at 1870 onward.

Superfast Broadband for Santon

NLC have advised that Superfast Broadband is likely to be available for Santon residents either late 2017 or early 2018, using money remaining from previous broadband projects.

As mentioned in earlier newsletters Santon is already connected to Fibre to the Cabinet (FTTC) technology. The fibre cabinet is located opposite San Pietro Restaurant on High Street East. Unfortunately, the distance between the fibre cabinet and Santon, of some two miles, is too far for there to be any improvements of broadband speeds. How the promised upgrade will be made hasn't been said other than it will be available later this or early next year

No solution has been found to extend the fibre cables to the Old Sawmill / Carr Side, Station Area nor Clapp Gate. The Parish Council has written to our MP, Andrew Percy, expressing disappointment that similar facilities are not being made available for residents at these locations.

The solution on offer for the Old Sawmill / Carr Side, Station Area and Clapp Gate is wireless broadband, but the choices of ISP and costs for similar services are not as favourable, albeit meeting Government targets for connection speeds. The supplier of the wireless system is Quickline of Hull.

Air Quality Monitoring


North Lincolnshire Council Environmental Health Department

North Lincolnshire Council (NLC) operate a number of air quality monitoring stations within the authorities region. The majority of these monitoring stations are located around the boundary of the Scunthorpe integrated steelworks.

The main measurement of air quality is by Particle Measure, the data collected and analysed by NLC is based on a particle size of 10 micron in size or less, this is abbreviated to PM_{10} . To make a size comparison, a human hair is about 100 micrometers, so roughly 40 fine particles could be placed on its width This measure is a mixture of materials that can include smoke, soot, dust, salt, acids, and metals..

Particulate matter also forms when gases are emitted from motor vehicles and Scunhorpe Town AQMA Boundary: industry undergo chemical reactions in the atmosphere

The council declared an air quality management area (AQMA) in 2005 for likely breaches of the 24 hour mean for PM_{10} dust in Scunthorpe. And in 2008 the council declared an air quality management area for a breach of the annual mean for PM_{10} dust at Santon.




Current Air Quality Monitoring - Santon

North Lincolnshire Council have two instruments measuring PM_{10} located 150 yards from Santon adjacent to the entry / exit barrier gates to British Steel. For the purpose of DEFRA reporting, the FDMS* instrument is used as it meets the European reference standard for PM10 monitoring. The TEOM** instrument at this site has a history of over recording. However the Council continue to operate the instrument as data from it is used to identify trends.

*Filter Dynamics Measurement System (FDMS) records gravimetric [or in other words the weight of] equivalent particulate data

**Tapered Element Oscillating Microbalance (TEOM) measures the mass collected on an exchangeable filter cartridge by monitoring the corresponding frequency changes of a tapered element

The Council also operated an air quality monitor at a property in Santon from 2007 to 2014. The monitor was removed in December 2014 due to compliance with PM_{10} air quality objectives. Full results for this monitor are:



Current Air Quality Monitoring Appleby

In 2007 an air quality monitor was located in Appleby. This monitor has always been compliant with PM₁₀ air quality objectives:



The Council have no plans to remove the monitor at Appleby as it provides a good site to monitor background levels of PM₁₀ and to determine the effect of regional or national pollution events like Saharan Dust.

As mentioned above PM₁₀ is particulate matter less than 10 microns in diameter. These are very small particles.. This dust is of particular importance in terms of health effects because the particles are small enough to be breathed in and carried deep into the lungs where they can cause inflammation and a worsening of the condition of people with heart and lung diseases.

Investigation into the possible sources of dust identified that the integrated steelworks was the principal source of the emissions. Monitoring data shows that the weather conditions, wind speed and direction and the distance from the steelworks are important factors in determining whether an area is likely to breach an air quality

The Council is working closely with the Environment Agency, Public Health England and the operators on this site to bring about improvements in the levels of PM10 dust. Data shows that the level of PM10 has been declining and the Council is in the process of reviewing the AQMAs and updating its Air Quality Action Plan.

After recent enquiries by residents the Parish Council regarding mains gas being supplied to Appleby village, a letter was sent asking National Gas Grid for information about connection costs.

To get connected the cost of installing the main would be split equally between all the properties within what is called an infill area project. National Grid Gas does not pay a contribution towards the main.

On top of the cost of the main, each property will pay for their own service off the main and that would be calculated individually depending on the distances and work involved.

40% of the properties within the infill area would have to accept and pay for the mains and service quotation before the infill goes ahead.

The mains contribution cost within the infill area would remain the same for 20 years.

Neighbourhood Watch Update

The main news throughout winter has been hare coursing on Appleby Carrs where those activities have been as frequent as I've know since living here. Community Police have been very active and there have been a number of successful arrests. Glyn Evans our local gamekeeper has been busy throughout this period and is very proactive with issues relating to our local countryside. Glyn is happy to take calls on 07796470868.

We had a well attended Neighbourhood Watch meeting in January which was attended by Inspector Tim Harvey of Humberside Police and also Tracey Coyne of Safer Neighbourhoods. Inspector Harvey expressed his determination to combat the incidents of coursing. Hare coursing is a seasonal activity i.e. winter when the fields are free of crops. Tim spoke of how hare coursing has become a large betting activity, where large sums of money can change hands between those involved, all of which is illegal, quite apart from the animal welfare issues. It was said that people involved with hare coursing are also suspected of being involved with other criminal activities, which is another reason that the Police like to know what's going on. Our Community Police took on extra overtime to increase their effectiveness over the winter.

As a result of this and other concerns raised at the NW meeting it has been arranged for PCSO Katy McNally to attend the Village Hall café morning every 5th Wednesdays morning to fall in line with her shift. Safer Neighbourhoods have also arranged for Sandra Joyce to drop in to the café in between Katy's visits. Safer Neighbourhoods are funded by North Lincolnshire Council and can help with a number of different social concerns that people may wish to know more about.

It is important to continue to use the 101 telephone service for non emergency calls to the police e.g. suspicious activities and it is never wrong to call 101 - text phone is available on 18001 101. The 999 service should be used for emergency calls or where a criminal activity is known to have been carried out. If you are deaf, deafened, hard of hearing or have a speech impairment, a text phone is available on 18000. Should you have reason to call our local Police from abroad call +44 1482 597 709
