There are now only 2 vicars serving the whole of North Scunthorpe, the Winterton Group, and the Barton and Flixborough Group. Before Covid there were 17 priests over the Manlake Deanery (which comprises Scunthorpe and North and South of Scunthorpe down to Kirton.) We are now down to 4. This means that small churches will run mainly without vicars in attendance. There will now only be one communion service a month between the other three Winterton Group churches, if there is a vicar available. We are actively seeking to keep the church open and used. This means that we will have to have community led services, without a Vicar.

Lincoln diocese have designated St Bartholomew's as a festival church meaning up to 6 services a year. We will still get a Vicar for baptisms, weddings and funerals. If you want to hold any of these services then please contact Erika Stoddart on 07955123014 or Pat Cooke on 07946558047.

Please come to our Community led Easter Service on Easter Day the 9th April at 10.30am. This will be an all age service and will include an Easter Egg Hunt in the church. There will be no formal communion as no vicar will be present.

We are looking to villagers for help in keeping the church open. There is a formal group that is needed to comply with Church of England rules, but also, we need others who want to help with fundraising, cleaning, repair works etc on an ad hoc basis.

Friends of Appleby Parish are proposing an open meeting after the **Friends AGM on the 10th May** for anyone interested in keeping the building open for the use of parishioners. You don't need to be C of E or even a church goer to help. This is a community building, an asset with a rich history that we want to keep open for the benefit of the village and future generations. Parish Council Keeping You Informed All Change

Ivor Keyes became Chairman of the Parish Council in 2017 and before that served as a parish councillor for many years has stepped down as he and Chris have moved over to Lancashire. A planned move had been on the cards for some time but no date had been set. They decided to put their home on the market expecting it to take some time to sell but it sold more or less immediately The quick sale meant they had to move much sooner than expected.

In view of Ivor's move it left the Parish Council without a Chairman. As we have local and parish council elections in early May I have agreed to act as Chair until the election after which a new Parish council will be formed and a Chairperson voted on by the elected councillors.

I feel it is very appropriate with Ivor moving away that we put on record a thank you for the contribution he made to the parish over many years. He worked tireless in getting things done for the parish, sorting out issues arising as well as steering many projects. Many thanks Ivor and Chris for your contribution to the parish. I'm sure with me all residents will wish Chris and Ivor every happiness in their new life in Lancashire.

For this Spring issue as I've only just taken over the reins it is difficult for me to give details of council progress so I'll close with a message Ivor penned before the move which he asked to be included in this newsletter:

"Time to say goodbye....



Chris and I are moving closer to daughter in Lancashire. Things have happened very quickly and so we will have gone by the time this Newsletter goes to print.

Paul Johnson has also stood down as a Councillor to spend more time with family as well, but is staying in the Parish. I mention Paul as he has been the longest serving current Councillor other than Derek Hall and had also been Chair of the Village Hall at the same time until a few years ago. Paul's contribution to the Parish has been immense, having carried out repair works to the VH, along with Angus Smith, who with Ann are also departing, among other things. Paul also led the way on Fayre days over the years, long before we were able to increase numbers to pull it it all together on the day. He

was also instrumental in introducing the coffee mornings in the first place with help from wife Jackie and Sheila Rhodes. He has checked over the playground equipment weekly for many years recognising issues for improvements, and so has made a huge contribution towards the safety of our children. I doubt his efforts ever being surpassed.

I've been privileged to work with a number of very special people in the Parish, many of whom were not Councillors. People who initially came together regarding potential wind farm development in the Ancholme Valley, which had the potential to stretch from near Broughton to Saxby Bridge, and then moving on to campaign for fibre to the cabinet for most of the Parish (it had been proposed that wireless would be the way forward). After that they worked together to develop the Neighbourhood Plan, which was also strongly supported by residents. We also found a Newsletter editor in the group, who no longer lives in the village, but continues to put in his efforts. Those people are named in the Appendices to the Plan on Parish Council's website.

Councillor wise we have had dedicated residents giving their time over a number of years and they have been a pleasure to work with.

And let us not forget the WI who raised so much for repairs to St Bartholomew's.

I'll take with me many memories one of which is worth a mention, if only for a laugh. Before a particular year's Fayre day preparation it came to light late late on that the dog demonstration team were not going to attend, and so at 9pm on the day before the Fayre day I paid a visit to a resident, dressed only in pyjamas, to persuade her to give a gun dog display, something she hadn't done before, however her training prowess was well known within field sports. She was brilliant on the day and has never done it since, perhaps the pyjamas were too much to bear a second time:)

The Local Boundary Commission - Local Election*

The Commission has published its final recommendations for new <u>local electoral</u> arrangements for North Lincolnshire.

The proposal means North Lincolnshire will be represented by 43 councillors in future. Their recommendations mean that those councillors should represent seven three-councillor wards, ten two-councillor wards and two single-councillor wards across the area.

These changes mean for North Lincolnshire Council <u>local elections</u> Appleby will no longer be in the same ward as Broughton but instead will be in the Burton-upon-Stather and Winterton ward. Appleby Parish Council will be supported by three North Lincolnshire Ward Councillors.

Appleby Litter Pickers!

Over 300 bags of litter so far collected!

The Appleby litter picking volunteers have been back in action this spring. You may have spotted the piles of sacks and bigger items dotted around the area awaiting collection from the ever helpful North Lincs Council.

Currently around 2000 sacks and counting have been filled with discarded litter. Thirty plus tyres have been liberated from hedge bottoms. Numerous small fly tips have been gathered up including discarded bags of nappies, numerous decorators' paint cans, builders rubble, old toys, house clearance articles and drug paraphernalia. There have been some more "memorable" finds too!



Together we have cleared around 13 miles of lanes - that's 26 miles of verges! Ermine Street all the way from Appleby Station at one end, north to the A1077 (apart from a section of narrow verge we deemed too dangerous to pick). As far as Winterton on the B1207 including side lanes and heavily littered verges around those lanes, and also North Street in Winterton, always a heavily littered area, particularly around the refuse site! We have also cleaned the 3 lanes going to Winteringham from the A1077



The Appleby Litter Pickers group started back in 2011. By 2013 over 3000 sacks had been filled! We covered a wider area back then, going as far as Brigg, Broughton, Roxby and Winterton as well as stopping off to clear rubbish from the Appleby woods car park area, and several lay-bys and field entrances where litter had piled up to unimaginable quantities. Since then there has been a growing awareness nationwide of the many benefits litter picking can bring. Not only to the environment but to the mental and physical wellbeing of the participants and communities. Social media has helped to highlight the issues as well as showcasing the numerous diverse community groups, large and small, that take an active interest.

So why do we do it? It's far easier to shrug shoulders and ignore. After all, surely the council should clear the verges? The sad reality is that they simply don't have the resources to litter pick every lane and verge - they HAVE been a fantastic support, collecting our piles of bags following our litter picks! We love where we live, the countryside and wildlife and hate to see it spoilt. Sometimes it's better to take matters into your own hands, get stuck in and get on with it.

Thank you to EVERYONE who takes time out to litter pick and special thanks this springtime to Michael, our Parish Clerk, for keeping us supplied with pink bags, and to Michael, Anthia, Joyce and Judie for their fantastic work.

If you fancy having a go, please get in touch with North Lincs Council to find out how you can get hold of equipment, pink refuse bags and where to leave them when full. Plus there's a plethora helpful advice and support on litter picking in general. Read up on safety matters then go out when you feel like it or when a littered area really gets to you! Doing something positive is empowering and deeply satisfying. Sure, it won't stop those who choose to litter from doing so, but it will help.

Finally, if you wish to show your support when you see us, or any other 'picker' in action, please give us a toot on your horn and a cheery wave (and a suitably wide berth) - a spot of encouragement goes a very long way! Little could be said to beat the sense of achievement when you have litter picked the beautiful lanes surrounding our village. The countryside is transformed! 6th May The Coronation Service



The Coronation of The King and The Queen Consort will take place at Westminster Abbey on Saturday 6th May 2023.

The Service will be conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury. The Royal Party will arrive at Westminster Abbey in procession from Buckingham Palace, known as 'The King's Procession'.

After the Service, The King and Queen Consort will return to Buckingham Palace in a larger ceremonial procession, known as 'The Coronation Procession' which ends the event with the Royal Party appearing the balcony

Ukrainian War

With the invasion by Russia on 24th February last year millions of Ukrainian families sought refuge outside of the war zone. In Appleby Tony and Lyn Cassidy are hosting the Buchynska family who made their way from Ukraine to Appleby village in July last year.

Theirs is a moving story

The hosts

Family Buchynska arrived from Lviv Ukraine at Doncaster Airport on 8th July 2022. Iryna (Mum), Maria (12) and Melania (7). One can only imagine the fear and stress they must have been experiencing as they emerged through the arrivals gate to a sea of alien faces. They had no English and one small case holding their belongings. It was a strange car journey from Doncaster to APPLEBY without a word being spoken.

Their accommodation at our home was all ready for them as was a welcoming meal though they ate very little. The children were extremely tired and it must have been a relief to them to be able to shut themselves away and reflect on their plight.

Since that stressful arrival, the family have done amazingly well in integrating into our English lifestyle. Iryna studies English at North Lindsey Tech and John Leggott College. She has a part time paid job at the Keb Care Home in APPLEBY and as a former news Cameraman in Lviv she has spent a day at BBC Look North Studio in Hull where she hopes to find an opening in the professional environment of television broadcasting.

Maria attends Winterton Academy. She is an exceptional artist and has received a number of awards at the school for academia

Melania attends Winterton Junior school and she is also doing very well with her school work.

We love having the family staying with us and hope they will remain until the war is over.

The Buchynska Family told by Iryna



Today, I would like to tell my refugee story and thank the people who accepted me, the people who are not indifferent to me, who supported and support me even now.

My life before the war was quite full. I had an interesting job on television as a news operator. Therefore, I believe that at that time I had faster access to the news, because I myself, as a cameraman, shot them for public television. And before the start of the war, I was not ready that there would be a war. Apparently, it is impossible to prepare for this. It was February 2022, and I was filming the news as usual at work.

(Ukraine War cont from previous column) And although all international media discussed the possibility of an attack by Russia, they did not want to believe it. And even when I was shooting the story that all the diplomatic employees of the embassies were being recalled from Lviv, I still did not believe that war was inevitable. The next shooting before the war, which made us think about possible events, is a job at the City Children's Surgery, where the American cardiac surgeon William Novak came to us with an educational visit. And while we were waiting for the press conference, he told us that he had to postpone his visit until now, although he previously planned to come to us in the summer, because we know that soon we will have a war, and our doctors will need this knowledge of how to operate on children very much . After the shooting, I came out very inspired that there are such people who dedicate their lives to helping humanity, but I was even more alarmed by what axiom our guest said.



In addition, there were films about shelters, about rehearsals when the siren will sound. But all the same, I stubbornly did not believe, just like my close environment. On the last peaceful Tuesday before the Russian attack, I filmed in the Regional Administration, and the top management came to the press conference in camouflage and told about the organization of the city's territorial defence communities. Only then did I understand that there would be a war... The war began on Thursday, February 24...

It was very scary. The first days, when you don't understand whether it's our plane or the enemy's plane, when you don't give yourself the opportunity to sleep, because I have the illusion of control, that this is how I control the situation and protect my children. This is mass panic, this is the constant wailing of sirens in the early hours and not understanding where to hide and go. When my children and I went down into the basement of our house, which was not safe for shelter, I knew that we had to flee the house. First, we went to the mountains and were able to stay there for two months. These horrors were easier to bear there.

At least I could explain to my children that I had a plan and that I was in control. Although I understood that I had no control over anything. This is war! That's why I started thinking about how to go abroad. When we returned to Lviv, we were greeted by the bombing of our city. The explosions were very close. My psyche pinched it off, and I stopped being afraid. I got to the other extreme, which is dangerous for life, it is not to be afraid at all and not to feel fear.

At that time, I was supported by a psychological support group. My colleagues in psychology and I gathered online every morning and evening and tried to share our fear and despair. It also helped at that time to weave camouflage nets for soldiers. When you constantly do monotonous work with your hands, hope appears that one day the war will end.(continued on page 5)

(Ukraine War continued from page 4) Through the Internet, we met the family of Tony and Lyn, who live in England. They agreed to receive us and give us shelter. It was very scary to leave home, family, friends and go. But I understood that my first duty was to protect my children.

When we arrived, we had a big language barrier. But there was no limit to the love we receive from Lyn and Tony. Gradually we warmed up. A cozy home for me and my daughters was waiting for us. It felt like they were waiting for us, that they were preparing for us. Clothes, interior items, everything was thought out to the smallest detail. There was food waiting for us in the fridge. But most of all, we were awaited with love, warmth and acceptance. Tony and Lyn took care of us with parental love.

Every week, Tony and Lyn, Maggie's friend, who is a teacher, came to teach me English. It was important for her to always say that she supports us and that we as a nation will win.

A large number of families living in the charming village of Appleby y responded with kind words and actions towards us. Those who have met us always say very insightful things, that they are with us and believe in our victory.

This is where my new life began. My girls adapted at school. I am grateful that I was able to get a job in a nursing home and partially implement my knowledge as a psychologist and photographer. But first of all, these are the people who are waiting for me in the house. It is very valuable and it is about love.

My life and that of my daughters goes on. England gave me shelter, but first of all I found parental love and interest in myself, friendly support and revived faith in people. Thank you, people of England, for responding and helping with such warmth and understanding.

Safer Neighbourhoods

Many thanks to Sandra for all her input to this newsletter over the last few years and welcome to Ruth to the role.

What is the role of Safer Neighbourhoods in the community?

Safer Neighbourhoods are the internal Community Safety Team of North Lincolnshire Council

It's role is the Crime and Disorder Reduction Department of North Lincolnshire Council and is responsible for contributing to the delivery of the Safer Communities Plan.

Annually their analyst produces a Joint Strategic Intelligence Assessment (JSIA) document which identifies the priorities for the partnership. The JSIA aims to provide an accurate picture of the current, emerging and longer-term issues facing the Partnership and shows performance against the priorities set out in the North Lincolnshire Safer Communities Plan.

The JSIA also identifies where the hotspots are for various crimes and who the offenders and victims are, enabling us to focus our resources

Elections 4th May 2023

Local elections, including Town and Parish elections, will be held on 4th May 2023.

Anyone who wants to have their say in the elections this May must also be registered to vote. It only takes five minutes to register online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote closing date to register on line is Monday 17 April

Nearer the date you will receive a polling card which will show the Polling Station you have to attend to place your vote

You will need ID to vote



A further requirement is for the first time, residents in North Lincolnshire (and other selected areas) will need to show photographic ID to vote at this year's local elections. Residents are being urged to make sure they are ready to vote in May by checking they have an accepted form of ID.

Accepted forms of ID include a UK, European Economic Area (EEA) or Commonwealth passport; a UK, EEA or Commonwealth drivers' licence; and some concessionary travel passes, such as an older person's bus pass or an Oyster 60+ card. Voters will be able to use expired ID if they are still recognisable from the photo.

Anyone who does not have one of the accepted forms of ID can apply for free ID online at the Government Voter Authority Certificate website or by completing a paper
